

LEHIGH CROSSING PARK

The park acquires its name from the three former railroads that once occupied the land – the New York Central (Auburn Line), the Lehigh Valley, and the Rochester and Eastern Rapid Railway (Trolley Line), whose trail corridors still border the park. With woods, wetlands and a pond located within this passive park; numerous birds, waterfowl and critters call this park home! There are several miles of multi-use trails with bridges, boardwalks and wildlife viewing opportunities as well as a seasonal restroom. Future plans include a wood-decked bridge on the Trolley Trail to carry park users over the Lehigh Valley Trail and an outdoor classroom with education stations.

Acreage: 54 Acres

Length of Trails: 3 Miles

Location: Victor-Mendon Road (NYS Rte. 251)

VILLAGE ON THE PARK

This neighborhood park situated off County Road 9 has multiple locations including rectangular athletic fields, a children's playground with a gazebo, and a sledding hill with multi-use trails on the park's drumlin. There are convenient parking areas at all locations and a seasonal restroom near the athletic fields. Future plans include a dog park area, additional athletic fields and athletic courts, and a pavilion with year-round restrooms.

Acreage: 70 Acres

Length of Trail: 2 Miles

Location: Victor-Egypt Road (County Road 9) just north of the NYS Thruway.



VICTOR MUNICIPAL PARK

One of Victor's most active parks, Victor Municipal Park has a variety of user experiences including a timber-frame picnic shelter, a children's playground, an accessible fishing dock with a stocked pond, an enclosed lodge and a special events amphitheater and bandshell. The park plays host to our annual summer concert series and youth fishing derby as well as numerous community gatherings and events! Future plans include a splash pad and additional multi-use trails to connect to the neighborhoods which surround this park.

Acreage: 47 Acres

Length of Trails: 2 Miles

Location: Paparone Drive off Brace Road, ½ mile south of NYS Route 96. Pedestrian / Bicycle entrance at East Street / Ellis Street.

PAPARONE PARK

(currently undeveloped)

The 16 acre parcel was acquired by the Town in 2005 and while it is not currently developed, the existing master plan for the park includes provisions for a community recreation center, athletic fields, pickleball courts, a picnic area and pavilion, and an outdoor classroom with wetland education stations and an adventure play area! The park also boasts the potential for bicycle and pedestrian connectivity to Victor Municipal Park (located on the west side of Brace Road) and to the Auburn Trail (located to the south).

FISHERS PARK

Located in the Hamlet of Fishers, Victor's oldest dedicated park provides recreational opportunities including hiking, fishing, nature appreciation and tennis / pickleball courts. Multi-use trails meander through the park across wooded ridges, through wetlands, along the banks of Irondequoit Creek and through a meadow that will provide you with exceptional views. There is a picnic area with tables and a seasonal restroom. Future plans include an outdoor classroom / adventure play area and a children's playground.

Acreage: 93 Acres

Length of Trails: 5 Miles

Location: Main Street Fishers, Wangum Road and Old Dutch Road.

HARLAN FISHER PARK

This park features a perimeter wooded area that creates a natural buffer to the surrounding neighborhoods. Park amenities include a children's playground, picnic area with tables, and a seasonal restroom. Future plans include a dog park, outdoor classroom / adventure or nature play area, and a picnic shelter.

Acreage: 6 Acres

Length of Trail: .5 Mile

Location: Lynaugh Road (Main Entrance)
Pedestrian / Bicycle Entrance at East Parkway and Ambassador Drive.

BOUGHTON PARK

Situated in the Town of East Bloomfield, this passive park has joint ownership by the Towns of Victor, East Bloomfield and West Bloomfield. The park includes two, large ponds, several miles of multi-use trails, canoe / kayak launches and racks and numerous places for a family picnic! Recommendations for the future include a lodge with restrooms, fishing docks and improvements to the park trail system. **The park is only open to residents of Victor, East Bloomfield and West Bloomfield. Park permits are free, but required** by the independent Boughton Park Commission.

Acreage: 330 Acres

Length of Trails: 5 Miles

Location: Two Entrances: East Bloomfield, Stirnie Road, ½ mile south of Town Line Road. Boughton Road, 2 miles west of NYS Route 444.

MARYFRANCES BLUEBIRD HAVEN

Gifted to the Town of Victor by Robert Butler in 1997, this park for special experiences includes an accessible fishing dock with a pond, looped multi-use trail, an enclosed lodge, a community garden and numerous bird nesting boxes suitable for New York's Official State Bird! Future plans include an outdoor classroom, an environmental education center / area and an arboretum highlighting native trees found within the region and throughout the northeast.

Acreage: 39 Acres

Length of Trail: 1 Mile

Location: Victor-Egypt Road (across from Valentown Road intersection)

DRYER ROAD PARK

Well known in our region for its expansive trail network and pump track that caters to mountain bikers of all skill levels; the park also features rectangular athletic fields, a children's playground, year-round restrooms, a picnic shelter and an artificial surface, box sports rink. Victor's largest park shares its eastern border with Ganondagan State Historic Site and has a trail connection to both the Fort Hill area and the "new" Seneca Art and Culture Center. Future plans for Dryer Road Park include additional athletic fields and a splash pad.

Acreage: 132 Acres

Length of Trails: 15 Miles

Location: Dryer Road

MEAD SQUARE PARK

Located in the heart of the Village near the Library, this pocket park is a great place to relax and eat your lunch or read a book! There are several benches, flower gardens and shade trees to enhance your experience.

Acreage: .3 Acres

Location: Main Street and Mead Lane
